What Whittemore Has to Say.

Boston, June 27 .- Ex-Congressman Whittemore, of South Carolina, was inferviewed by a reporter of the News on Saturday. He emphatically denies that he received money for appointments to cadetships, and severely comments on his expulsion from Congress, calling it unconstitutional and establishing a dangerous precedent.
