The Amended Bankrupt Law. The bankrupt law has been amended by a recent act of Congress in some few particulars which are worthy of public notice. Provison is now made that the circuit judge, in cases of the sickness, absence or other disability of the district judge, may make all necessary rules and orders causes of bankruptcy. The law provides also that the provisions of that section known as the fifty per cent clause shall not apply to these debts, from which the bankrupt seeks dis-charge, which here contracted prior to the 1st of January. In other words, a debtor whose assets do not pay fifty cents on the dollar must now obtain the assent of a majority, in number and value, of those creditors only, whose debts were contracted since the 1st of January, 1869.
