

DEATH BY LIGHTNING. A Terrible Thunder Storm at Kingston, New York—Five Persons Instantly Killed by the Same Bolt—Several Others Severely Injured—Barns and Houses Set on Fire.

Our readers will remember the terrible thunder storm at Kingston, Ulster county on Thursday evening last, during which five persons were killed and others severely injured by the same stroke of lightning.

Union avenue was crowded with persons going to the circus, the tent for which had been pitched in that avenue.

By the time the performance commenced there could not have been less than fifteen hundred human beings under the canopy. This was just before eight p. m., and large drops of rain had already commenced to fall, while the thunder without drowned the voice of the ring-master within.

A short distance from the main tent was a similar tent used as a fruit stand, and a few feet from this stand stood a willow tree, located in the corner of a yard of an adjoining dwelling.

Suddenly one blinding sheet of flame lit up the entire scene; and a peal of thunder which shook the earth, while the air seemed impregnated with a sulphurous mist. The scene which then occurred inside the circus tent baffles all description.

The bolt appeared to come from the west, cutting a hole about twelve feet square through the top of the main canvas, thence across an open space to the willow tree spoken of above, forty yards distant, shattering the tree, killing the horse which was tied to it, and knocking senseless the driver, tearing the soles from his boots and singeing his clothes.

For full five minutes after the awful visitation no one could stir in the vicinity. All were struck dumb and unconscious, and were paralyzed. Twenty-five persons under the fruit tent were knocked down and severely injured.

When the true state of affairs outside became known under the main canvas there was no holding the audience, and then the entertainment for the evening ended at once. As a rush was made for the open air, it was ascertained that scores of persons could not leave their seats.

Another had a part of his coat torn away; another had lost the rim of his hat, and dozens were almost unconscious. They sat like statues, and there was a gaze of vacancy in their eyes that was frightful to look upon.
