A Great Crime. The following dispatch was received to-day by Secretary Boutwell from Collector Robb, of Savannah, Georgia, dated to-day: "I have just this moment learned that the flag on the Custom house was at half-mast for the death of General Lee. It was ordered by my deputy without my knowledge. I have ordered the flag at full mast. Much public feeling is manifested at my action. Shall the flag be lowered again? Answer immediately." In response to the above, Secretary Boutwell has telegraphed to Mr. Robb approving his action.

The war ended six years ago. The southern people have shown every disposition to forget and forgive and return to their allegiance to the United States, and to uphold the old flag, but how they are met by the great "God and morality party," the above dispatch shows. These radicals propped up as patrons of meekness, yet, even as following in the footsteps of the lowly, meek and forgiving Jesus, yet six years after our late civil strife, after being conquerors, and gaining full satisfaction, having humiliated the southern half of our country, these radicals carry in their bosoms the venom of hate against their southern brethren, and are boiling over with the spirit of devilish revenge, and keeping open the sores of our bleeding country.

The memory of Gen. Lee can bear such petty spite as the above, and he will be respected and remembered here, and wherever civilization has a foothold when such men as Boutwell will have been despised and forgotten. Gen. Lee, every day of his life, was a purer and better man—a better Christian than any of these hateful radical leaders, and if they would follow his example in purity and uprightness, they would become entitled to the respect of decent men.

Respect to the Memory of Robert E. Lee.

The whole south is in mourning over the death of this distinguished soldier—the greatest captain of the age. From all the southern cities come accounts like the following:

Louisville, October 14.—Most of the business houses of this city will be closed to-morrow throughout the day in respect to the memory of Robert E. Lee, and many will be dressed in mourning. The bells in the city will be tolled all day, and at night a meeting of the citizens will be held and addressed by John C. Breckinridge and others.

New Orleans, October 14.—Business is suspended and the houses throughout the city are draped in mourning in honor of General Lee.

Charleston, October 14.—The death of General Lee caused profound sorrow here. The bells tolled yesterday and flags are at half mast on shipping and throughout the city. The Chamber of Commerce met this morning and took appropriate action.

Effect of Negroes Voting.—Last year Clearfield borough gave a Democratic majority of 44, which was about the highest she ever gave on the State ticket.

Last Tuesday four negroes voted there for the first time. The vote was just four short of that of 1864, and the Democratic majority 85.

In Bellefonte, last year, the Republican majority was 95. About fifty negroes, all Republicans except one, voted there on Tuesday last, and now the Democrats carry the borough by a majority of 1.

Some of the effects of negro voting can be seen in Chester and Delaware counties. The official majority for J. Henry Askin, Esq., the Democratic candidate for Congress in Radnor, was 75 in a total poll of 323, including eleven negro votes, all voted the Radical ticket. Last year, the Radical majority was 75. This makes a gain to the Democracy of 110 in one year.

The Radical majority in Chester county, in 1868, was 2,045. This year, over 1,200 negroes voted the Radical ticket, and the majority runs down to 1,750. This shows a loss of over 1,500. In Delaware, the same average Radical loss is exhibited by the returns. This shows that the Radicals lose more than they gain by connection with the negro. Mr. Askin made a gallant fight in his district, and polled a heavy vote. When such men as Mr. Askin lead the Democratic ticket, the people will be sure to respond in a proper manner.
