SINGULAR SUICIDE IN NEW ORLEANS.

A Young Gentleman and Lady Jump into the River.

One of the most remarkable cases of suicide that has ever startled the community occurred at the foot of Soraparu street, about five o'clock this (Tuesday) morning. A young man and woman, by mutual consent, proceeded to the river's edge, and, locking hands jumped into the river and were drowned. The name of the man is Andrew Ryan; he is about twenty-three years of age, and a native of Ireland. The girl's name is Jane Sweeny, seventeen years of age and a native of Scotland. It has been ascertained that they were lovers, gain, and for some time had been living in inti-

mate relations. The girl's nature recoiled from this disreputable life, and her importunities have been incessant that be would marry her. The persuasions of her friends were also added; and the man was finally given to understand that this act of justice to the girl could be no longer postponed. Her sin was the result of inexperience- of her friendless condition and affection for him. These representations were however, unable to subdue his repugnance to marriage, and he stated that he would rather die than submit to such an alternative. The following is a recent decision in the Supreme Court of Maine, in the case of Goddard vs. the Grand Trunk Railway Company:

The plaintiff, a passenger in the cars of the company, surrendered his ticket to the brakeman who was authorized to receive it. Afterwards the brakeman denied receiving the ticket, called the plaintiff a liar, charged him with trying to avoid the payment of his fare, and with having done the thing before; threatened to split his head open; shook his fist violently in the plaintiff's face, and only stopped the assault when the whistle sounded for the next station. It appeared also that the plantiff was at the time in feeble health, having been for some time in the care of a physician; that he had neither said nor done anything to provoke the assault; that he had paid his fare, received and surrendered his ticket to the brakeman, who had delivered it to the conductor, in Rep. whose hands it was afterwards identified; that the defendants were notified of the misconduct of brakeman, but instead of discharging him retained him in their service, where he was at the time of the trial. In view of the aggravated character of the assault, and the attendant circumstances, the jury rendered a verdict for the plaintiff of exemplary damages to the amount of \$4,850. 
