nishes the following details, relative to the sinking of the Arizonia: The Arizonia left this port, bound for Han-nibal, with a load of railroad iron, on Thurs Thursday night. She started out after day-break yesterday morning, to continue her trip, and had to contend with a gorge of ice just above Alton. A portion of the gorge broke loose, and swinging round, forced the Arizonia against a heavy mass of short ice, which penetrated her hull about midships. Two or three planks were broken in and the ice became tightly wedged into the cavity. While the boat was backing down to Altor again, the ice was knocked out of the cavit in the hull, and she commenced filling wit water. She sunk in about aix feet water, directly opposite Alton, about one hundred yards from shore. The Arizonia lies perfectly straight. from shore. The Arizonia lies perfectly straight with the water over her main dock, aft of the boilers, her forcastle being out. There is very little doubt that she can be raised with her own pumps, and will probably be afloat again to day. She had nothing but railroad iron, which will not be damaged, of course.
