It ber of deaths in our city during the year 1859. It would seem from it that we are highly favored, as it shows a ratio of but one in eighty. The number of deaths recorded for the year is eight hundred and fifty-nine—four hundred and thirty-two males, three hundred and eighty-two females, and forty-two still born. Two hundred and eighty-two females, and forty-two still born. Two hundred the still water makes under the still and the st females, and lorty-two still born. I wo hundred and sixty were males under twenty, and only one hundred and seventy-two over that age. Two hundred and nineteen females died under twenty, and sixty after attaining that age. The mortality of children under twelve years of age and adults was about the same. Of the above, the diseases were as follows: comsumption, one hundred and nineteen; cholera infantum, sixty-one; bronchitis, seventeen; convultions. sions, twenty-nine; diarrhoea, twenty-eight; congestion of the brain, fourteen; scarlet faver, one hundred and one, typhoid fever; thirty-one; inflammation of the brain, twenty-three;

one; innammation of the brain, twenty-three; pneumonia, twenty-three; small pox, sixteen, marasmus, thirteen, and other ordinary diseases, with some violent deaths. Such an exhibit as the above is most favorable to us, and sustains the reputation of Pittsburgh as the healthiest city in the world.
