A STRANGE STORY.
Remarkable and Extraordinary Narrative of the recitation of Young Joseph Taylor, who was supposed to have been hanged to Death, in Company with that Notorious Highwayman, John Andrew, and his Brother, Archibald Taylor, on Boston Neck, on Thursday, the 8th of May, 1788, for a violent Assault and Robbery on the Highway, committed on the Person and Property of Mr. Andrew, a Merchant, in Boston, on October 17th.

In a letter from Joseph Taylor to his kind friend and countryman, Mr. Philip Deane, in Boston.
Dear Friends: You will, no doubt, be greatly amused at receiving a letter from one whom you lately saw, all appearance, numbered with the dead, with all the ignominy of a public and violent execution. But strange as it may appear, it is no less true than that, that I am still alive, and that I have recovered from the effects of the gall which were taken to recover me the life immediately after my being hanged. But the doctor who attended me, would not admit of my recovery, and I was confined in a cell for more than five years in the secret, as he feared a discovery, and a crowd around me would be fatal, and prevent the getting into my lungs, and I believe Taylor had brought with him, made the five.
