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THE WAR EXCITEMENT.

The war feeling yesterday was, if possible, more intense than ever. New companies were organizing and old ones filling up. Among the former we may note those of Capt. Hugh S. Fleming, of Allegheny, which is rapidly filling up, now about fifty strong; the Federal Guard, Allegheny, Capt. J. C. Hall; First Lieutenant, Israel V. Hays; Second Lieutenant, Robert A. Scott; Second Sergeant, Andrew N. Kennedy; Hugh Murphy, Orderly Sergeant; about the same number of men; the Government Guards, Capt. Holt; Anderson, recruiting at Lloyd's new building, Fifth street; the Union Cavalry, organizing at the St. Charles Livery Stable, Third street; the Independent Rangers, organized as follows, and last filling up: Captain, T. J. McComb; First Lieutenant, Robert Galway; Second Lieutenant, James A. McKnight; Second Sergeant, J. K. Barbour; F. H. Anderson, Orderly Sergeant; the Pennsylvania Light Guards, now nearly ready for service; the Iron City Guards, Capt. DeWitt, recruiting at No. 250 Liberty street; Opt. Abijah Ferguson's company; the Western Riflemen, and a number of others.

The Home Guard is rapidly filling up in every district, as will be seen by a glance elsewhere. In the Second Ward, last evening, one hundred men were drilled. Bernard Dougherty and others are organizing a company of men over 40, for home service, in the Sixth Ward; Capt. H. C. Coulter, Dr. J. J. McComb, Robert Galway, Second Lieutenant, Col. M. The Hon. Wm. F. Johnston stated that the articles mentioned were a shipment from our arsenal, by order of the Secretary of War, to Col. M. Kinstry, St. Louis, and he doubts the propriety of the interference of a committee. Mr. Finney offered the following, which was adopted:
