Washington, June 13 - Senator Chase has ! just addressed another circular to Collectors of Customs, referring to the instructions of the 2d of May, prohibiting the transmission of munitions of war, provisions or other supplies to parties in insurrection against the United States. They are further instructed to exercise the utmost vigilance in arresting and detaining all merchandiss of whatever character, the ultimate destination of which they have satisfactory reason to believe is for insurgents against the United States, or for places under beir control.

If you are satisfied the circular continues either from the nature of the articles or otherwise that any merchandiz- wherever destined in name, is in fact destined for persons of embinations against the government of the United States, you will cause the same to be seized and proceeded against for forfeiture. If, however, you are satisfied that any merchandize transmitted for States or places under insurrectionary control, is not intended for actual insurgent, and has been shipped or forwarded without intent to afford aid and comfort to such insurgents, or otherwise to violate any law, you will simply detain such merchandize, and notify the shippers or forward. ers or their agents of such detention and atute to with profound interest, and not a dissent-
