A LARGER ARMY WANTED. There is alarm at Washington City for fear of an attack from the rebels-although we think the alarm is needless, for if they had intended to attack the capital they would have done so before our troops had so effectually intrenched it.

If the despatches to the Herald are to be believed, the Government does not yet find itself sufficiently prepared with troops to risk any decisive action with the rebels. New troops are still going on to the seat of getting stronger and in better discipline.
