THE SUSTEDANCE OF THE FAMI-ERS ACT !

The committee appointed to provide for the relief of the families of those who have gone to the war are now expending about \$1,200 per week, or about \$5,000 per month. The citizens of the city and the banks have abscribed most liberally. Hitherto almost the entire cost of the incidental expenses, Oscanoned by this war, have fallen upon equipersonal and and a start of the soldiers who have generated and have provided for their families. But more, much more will be necessary be done. The city has done her share now the public voice calls upon the county authorities to take prompt and im mediate action to provide for the future ne ities of the families of those who hav gone to the war. An act of the extra sesion of the Legislature authorized the Com missioners of this county to levy a tax no exceeding 21 mills on the dollar of valua tion for this specific purpose. The Relie Committee have asked them, as the dupl castes are now being issued, to levy a tax o two mills. This would produce a fund of \$50,000 or thereabouts and this amount will certainly be needed. It is just that this levy should be made. Those who have re mained at home to raise their crops, while their fellow citizens are fighting for the **rovernment** cannot with reason complain at contributing of their means to support their families. The cities have already done nobly, and of this levy now called for the citizens of the city will have to pay twothirds.

We learn with surprise, and the citizen will learn with indignation, that the County Commissioners have not yielded to the re quest of the Relief Committee and manifest no disposition to exercise the power conferred upon them by the Legislature to levy this tax. 


