PROCLAMATION OF THE GOVERNOR OF PENNA* RELATIVE TO THE MILITARY FORCES OF THE COMMONWEALTH.

PRNNSTLVANIA, 88: In the name and by the authority of the Common-lus)wealth of Pennylvinia, ANDREW G. CURTLY, flowering of and Commonwealth. PROCLAMATION. PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS, By the twelfth section of the Act of Assembly, passed the Pfifteenth day of May, 1861, it is provided that it shall not be lawful for any Volunteer Soldier to leave this Commonwealth as such, unless he shall have been first accepted by the Governor of this State, upon a call under a requisition of the President of the United States made upon the tovernor direct, for troops for the Service of the United States.

AND WIEREAS, Notwithstanding such prohibition, sundry persons/many of them encaged in regions. sundry persons (many of them engaged in raising regiments to be furnished from other States) are persisting in endeavoring to enlist volunteers in violation of law.

perseting in endeavoring to enlist volunteers in violation of law.

AND WHERZES, It is necessary for the public service and for the honor of Penn-ylvania, that her military force should be regularly organized and furnished for the suppression of the existing rebellion, in conformity with the axis of Congrees of twenty-second and twenty-fifth July, 1881, and with the laws of the State, and that her citizens should not be seduced into organizations independent of the State anthority whereby the raising of her quota is embarrassed, the regiments are not enrolled in her Archives, the families of the men are deprived of the rehef provided by the laws of the State for the tambos of her own volunteers, and the State herself by the absorption of her men in such unlawful organizations may be found unable to supply volunteers to fill the future requisitions of the Government of the United States.

And WERKEAS, The following order has been is such unlawful organizations or the United States, viz: WAR DEPARTMENT, September 25, 1861.

His Excellency A. G. CORTIN, Governor of Pennsylname, Harrishurg.

Siz:—I have the honor to transmit the following order from the War Department:

1. All men now enrolled or mustered into the service of the United States for brigades, regiments, 1. All men now enrolled or mustered into the service of the linted Istates for brigades-recipiments, batteries or companies in the state of Pennsylvania, under the direct authority of the Secretary of War, are placed under the command of the Governor of Pennsylvania, who shall organize or re-organize them as he may deem most advantageous to the interests of the General Government.

2. The United States will continue to furnish subsistence, camp equipage, clothing, &c., as heretofore, for the organizations referred to in the first paragraph, and all U. S. commissaries and quarier-masters will furnish, on requisitions made, the necessary subsistence, clothing, &c.,

3. All authorizations heretolore given to said brigades, regiments or companies in the State of Pennsylvania, are hereby revoked from and after the expiration of the times limited in the original authority, or in any renewals heretofore granted; and the cases where no limit of time here it from here

Tenneylvania, are hereby revoked from and after the expiration of the times limited in the original authority, or in any renewals heretefore granted; and in cases where no limit of time has been specified, then from and after the expiration of ten days from the date of this order; and in future all volunteers for the service of the United States shall be raised, in Pennsylvania, only under requisitions made on the fovernor.
