Scarcely more than a month ago it was said that Pennsylvania had not furnished more than half her quota of troops under the act of Congress authorizing the Presi-BEND YOUR DOLLA BY MAIL AT OUR RISK dent to raise a force of 500,000 men to crush out this rebellion. This may have been true so far as related to regiments in actual service, but in every part of the State regiments were being formed and rapidly filled up. It was also authoritatively stated that drafting was about to be resorted to for the purpose of compelling our citizens to enlist so that the number of men required of us could be put into the field at once. We do not believe that, with the knowledge they possessed, such an idea was ever entertained by our Stat uthorities. But, whatever may have been the misgivings of any as to our abili-ty to furnish the quota without compulsion, Pennsylvania can now present a record which is a source of pride and gratification o every loyal citizen of the State. furnished twenty-six regiments for the three months' service, three fourths of whom, after returning home, re-enlisted for the war and are now again in the ser vice of the State. We now have, around Washington City, at least fifty thousand men, fully armed and equipped, awaiting the opportunity to wipe out the disgrace incurred by a few Pennsylvanians on the day of the memorable battle at Bull's Run The good work has already been com menced by Col. From Fronton, Missouri. IRONTON, Oct. 18.—No other bridge an that at Big River has been interfered with on the Iron Mountain Railroad, and o rebels are now known to be near the oad. The Eighth Wisconsin Regimen is now here, and another regiment with Major Schoffield. A battery of artillery is nderstood to be on the way, which wil make this point secure against attack. The rebels are reported in large force twenty-live miles below here, but nothing definite s known as to numbers or designs.

Latest from Lentucky, Louisville, Oct. 17.—The rebol General Hawthorne, of the Mississippi brigade at Hopkinsville, Kentucky, transferred that postofiles to the charge of a Confedostmaster, thus the Southern Ker tucky towns are regularly supplied with Southern mails, under authority of the rebel Postmaster General. It is reported that General Hardee is in command at Bowling Green with ten thousand troops including two thousand Toxans, whom from their wild appearance, the people there take for Indians. Quite an accumulation of Southward bound travelers are at our hotels, who find it impossible to get through our lines.

Gen. McClellan at Vienna. WASHINGTON, Oct. 18 .- Gen. McClel an, accompanied by Generals Smith, McCleil, and Hancock, and a strong escort of regular cavalry, proceeded yesterday to Vienna, which is live miles West of Lewnsville, and remained there several hours. The reports about the rebel army being in full retreat for Manassas, are founded on conjecture. At least nothing of it is known in quarters most entitled to confidence. As stated in a previous dispatch, a large reconnoitering party proceeded as far as Vienna, but returned before General McClellan had quite reached the village,

Latest from Fortress Monroe FORTRESS MONROE, October 17 .- No lags of truce will be permitted to start rom here for Norfolk, for a number of lays; neither will any from the rebels be permitted to come this side of Sewell's Coint Appearances indicate that the rebel frigate Merrimac has been brought down a short distance from Norfolk.
