**CITY MATTERS.**

**PICKPOCKETS ABOUT.**—We are informed that four Eastern pickpockets arrived during their brief stay at the city and have been pursuing their avocation quite energetically. On Wednesday evening there was quite a rush at the Theatre, and two men at the door had their pockets picked, the other some \$20 in gold and paper money. One of the men was arrested by the police on suspicion, but on searching him by the two men was found and he was quietly discharged. At Trimble's Varieties another of his pockets was picked, and two others have suffered and the criminals seem to have made a good thing of it. One of these is a heavy set, black-headed individual, who has been seen in the city by the police, but on citizens they will probably return to so fruitful a field.
