When brought before the Mayor Collier pleaded poverty and promised to quit the business and the Mayor let him off with a list of 200, though he had been arrested. It is said that he would probably have been awarded him had the case been returned to Court.

Rebels Deploring the Kentucky Fight—They Confess a Terrible Defeat.
BALTIMORE, January 27.—The Richmond Dispatch of Friday shows that the rebels are much perplexed at their defeat in Kentucky. The Dispatch says that they regret to say the report of the Federal victory in Kentucky, conveyed to us on Wednesday night from Northern sources, is more than confirmed by intelligence received here at 10 P. M. War Department. It appears that our defeat was more decisive than even Northern accounts had led us to believe. The report says that the rebels in Eastern Kentucky, and the appropriation it has excited for the safety of our position with the Southern army, Virginia and Tennessee, and East Tennessee, and via the railroad, and possible interruption of our intercourse with the South, via the Wilmington and Weldon Railroad, by the Burnside expedition, directs attention to the vital importance of completing the connection between Richmond and Danville, and the North Carolina Railroad.

Force of the Rebels in South West Missouri and Arkansas
ROLLA, Mo., January 26.—A prominent citizen south west Missouri has just arrived from Missouri, and reports that the force of the rebels in South West Missouri and Arkansas, with about four hundred men, stayed all night at Mount Vernon on Tuesday night the 14th, on his way to Granby, where he said they were going to work in the coal mines. The rebels were made to arrest all the men who had been connected with the home guard companies and put them to work in the mines. In consequence of this, a large number of Union citizens were leaving the country.

From Washington
New York, January 27.—The Washington correspondence of the New York papers says: A rebel deserter, who came into our lines last evening, contradicts the report that the rebels have taken back from Massachusetts. He says about ten regiments have gone South, but that the main body of the rebel army has not yet been repositioned. They have nearly abandoned the idea that Gen. McClellan intends to attack them this winter.
