HORSE STRALED EXTRAORDINARY.—Last week a horse belonging to John Grossman, of the Third Ward, Allegheny, was seized on an execution issued by Alderman Smith and placed for safe keeping in the stable of a tavern keeper named Gub, where it was to remain until the day of sale. On Friday night last some person entered the stable, cut the halter with which the animal was secured, and although diligent search was made, neither the horse nor the thief was anywhere to be found. Early on Thursday morning, officers Hubson and Arest proceeded to the address of Grossman, where they found the missing horse in the stable, and secured it before the Alderman, and a default of \$500 bail, committed for trial.

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ANOTHER KEMEL MURDER.—Captain Latham, of Company B, Virginia, while scouting on Cheat river, in Hancock county, Va., some days ago, captured a party of rebel soldiers, and after a forty-five day chase, and after a long and arduous march, he succeeded in putting them to flight. The rebels lost six killed and several wounded. The Captain had several men killed in the action, but six were wounded. Captain Latham was shot in the breast and was unable to go to camp. He was left at a place known as "Soldier's Wharf," and after the Captain and his men returned to camp, three or four rebels came to the house, and after they dragged him from his dying couch, carried him out in the yard, and with an axe murdered him, and then fled to their dens in the mountains.

THE CLEVELAND AND PITTSBURGH RAILROAD.—The annual report of this company is published. It shows that the number 80th, receipts from freight, passengers, mail, etc., about \$1,110,000. The entire expenses, including interest on first mortgage, and other charges, were \$1,078,287, leaving a net profit of \$31,713. The earnings of the past year were \$1,110,000, while the total number of miles run by all trains had been 800,525, showing an increase of 64,017 miles over that of 1860.

CONSOLIDATION OF PENNSYLVANIA TROOPS.—Governor Curtin proposes to the War Department the formation of the consolidated regiments from our State into a division, which will consist of 9,000 men, 1,600 cavalry, 1,800 artillery, and 5,600 infantry. This will be a formidable body of men, especially if the Governor's suggestion of brigading the whole near Philadelphia, is carried out, for drill and discipline.
