On Saturday morning the battle was renewed with anusual vigor and determination. The 8th, 18th, 20th and 21st Illinois regiments occupied a position above the fort. They were about preparing a little food when the rebels opened on them a fire of musketry. A line of battle at once was formed, and the storm of leaden hail was returned, perceptibly thin ning the rebel ranks. The rebels, from their advantageous positions, showered upon our ranks most murderous voileys of musketry, grape and cannister, killing and wounding our men almost by companies at every round; yet every man stood his ground. Bravely, determinedly and without flinching these four regiments

held their ground, dealing death, dying rebels directed their heaviest fire, but instead of falling back they advanced to the very face of the enemy, and there stood lilinois: in the very jaws of death, with scarcely any prospect that a single one would ecape.
