Latest From North Carolina—
Gen Burnside's Movement.
ROBTAS MONROE, February 25.—The steamer Burnside, which left New York on the 20th inst., and arrived here on the 23rd, returned from Hatteras about noon to day, having left yesterday afternoon. The news is not of special interest.
The burning of Winton, North Carolina, is confirmed. The Ninth New York regiment was an expedition up the Chowan river with three gunboats, and having found the enemy in full force, returned without making an attack.
A copy of the passenger list of the steamer Charles Henry Foster, who was yesterday reported killed by the rebel parties, at Winton.
The election ordered by the Provisional Government of North Carolina to take place on Saturday, resulted in the re-election of Mr. Moore. The ordinances of the Provisional Government were also ratified.
The object of the expedition of the 9th New York regiment was to destroy the railroad bridges on Blackwater and Chowan rivers. The enemy was discovered by the forces of Winton, and no landing was made. The rebels fled at our boats, and in retaliation the town was burned.
The greater part of the expedition was still at Roanoke City, Williams Bridge, as Hatteras had been reported to be occupied by the rebels.
The steamer R. R. Spaulding left Roanoke Island, on Friday, for Elizabeth City, with the prisoners taken by Gen. Burnside. They were paroled for exchange.
The Spaulding had left Roanoke Island for Hatteras, and will be due here tomorrow.
Capt. Howard's battery went to Newport News to day.
