The Petroleum Trade. At a meeting at the Board of Trade rooms, Philadelphia, on Monday, H. C. Hickok, Esq., late State Superintendent Schools, John Alexander and others detailed their experience in the petroleum bill region. Prof. Hickok gave a statement of facts

nwhich had come under his personal obser-vation in the course of two years resi-dends in the business with the Venango oil region. Mr. Hickok stated that he was here by accident, and had been called on by the Board of Trade without time being afforded him to prepare a thorough being anorded him to prepare a thorough statistical account. The production of oil began from wells of fifty to a hundred and fifty feet deep, bared in the narrow valley of Oil creek and its branches, mostly in Venango county, from which the oil was raised by pumping.

In the course of last summer a well was sunk 470 feet deep, and a vein was struck from which the oil flowed profusely with out pumping, and now a large number of such wells exist, mostly along Oil creek and within a distance of seven or eight miles, a few being on the Alleghony river below its muth. These flowing wells yield variously, 100 to 500, 1000, 1500, and in one case 3000 barrels of oil per day, when allowed to flow. The immense quantity they have yield have quantity they have yielded has so reduced

the price, however, that the flow of oil has n partially or wholly shut off by stopcocks in the tubing, and they are allowed to yield freely only when satisfactory orders are to be filled. This temporary osing of the flow has not been found to affect their productiveness. The quantity of oil raised and ready for transportation, as was actually observed two weeks since by Mr. Hickok, amounted to about 25,000 barrels in vats, near the wells; 14,000 do. at the railroad stations, awaiting transportation, and 25,000 do at Oil Oity, awaiting shipment down the Allegheny river.
