In the present war, one of the parties stands in the double relation of enemies and citizens. No nation had any right to interfere with us in the treatment of our own criminals. He was tired of hearing the leaders of this rebellion called "brethren."

He also contended that, as the armies go South, they must be subsisted upon the rebels, and those who had broken the peace should be obliged to support those who come to restore it. He would give the rebels sixty days to lay down their arms, and those who persist in the rebels. arms, and those who persist in the rebe lion should suffer the consequences.
