The Army on the Move. UPPERVILLE OCCUPIED BY GEN. PLEASANTON.

Snicker's Gap in our Possession. Latest New Orleans News. Federal Forces at Island No. 10.

HEADQUARTERS ARMY OF THE POTOMAC. The advance of the Army of the Potomac up the valley, on the left side of the Blue Ridge...

General Pleasanton occupied Upperville this afternoon, after a spirited engagement with the enemy for four hours. We had no killed but several wounded.

Our troops now hold all the gaps up to Snicker's Gap, with every prospect of having that to-morrow.

There was some force of the enemy today in front of Snicker's Gap, on the left bank of the Shenandoah, to dispute our passage at that point.

The rumors of the invasion of Maryland, by the way of Downsville, is not believed at these headquarters by the last reports from the rear.

The army is ready and prepared to fight a general battle at any time and place, where the enemy may see proper to meet them. It is in a better condition than it has ever been, with the exception of the want of more cavalry.

The rebels were evidently fooled, (instead of being Snicker's and Ashby's troops), and give us little trouble. They were marching on the other side to take it when we entered. We threw shells among their forces, which whistled and returned on the double quick.

Major O'Neil, of Gen. Meagher's staff, was captured and afterwards released. All the people, as well as the soldiers, were taken by surprise at our appearance.

CAIRO, Nov. 3.—Advices from Holly Springs to Wednesday say that large reinforcements from Louisiana are pouring in and moving on from that place against Vicksburg.

The people of Hernando are said to be moving their slaves and other property into the interior.

The Grenada (Miss.) Appeal says that Judge John A. Campbell has been appointed Assistant Secretary of War of the Confederate States, vice Professor Meigs.

The Federal forces at Island No. 10 have again occupied the Tennessee shore, and are now constructing a fort, under the protection of a Federal battery.

A dispatch from Jackson, Tenn., dated the 2d, says that news was received at there, that headquarters yesterday from the South view, confirming the capture of Mobile.

NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—The steamer Cahawba has arrived from New Orleans with dates to the 27th. She brings 200 sick soldiers. The following died during the passage: A. G. Chatterton, Jos. Camp, Julius B. Jathrop and W. G. Coder, of the 6th Michigan regiment.

Seventy-three United States soldiers arrived at New Orleans on the 27th, from Texas, to join the Union army, desiring to return to their homes, from whence they have been driven by the rebels.

Col. Paine, of the 2d Louisiana regiment, has recovered.

Capt. Wm. Gordon, of Boston, has been appointed Commander of the United States garrison Rhode Island.
