CITY AND NEIGHBORHOOD INTELLIGENCE

The Pittsburgh Regiments, Letters and dispatches received yesterday from the army...

From Col. Collier's regiment we have no names of the men who were killed, but a letter received yesterday afternoon states that only three in the regiment were wounded.

On Wednesday night the residence of David Sims, Third Ward, tax collector, Bojold, of Allegheny, was entered, and a musty smell in money and county warrants to a large amount, and valuable papers carried off. The police were promptly advised of the robbery.

The Orphan's House. The Butte Herald, in noticing the late destruction of this building by fire, says: "Temporary shanties are about being put up to serve the present distress, and it is building as soon as possible. For this purpose, material, labor, money and means are wanting, and also for the children, food and clothing."

Quite a number of sick and wounded soldiers have recently been placed in the Western Pennsylvania Hospital, which is now in charge of the United States government. Others are expected shortly. The hospital is admirably situated and well appointed and the patients will be well taken care of.

On Saturday last a mass of slate fell down at the Park Colliery, on the Pennsylvania Railroad, burying John Garvey and Wm. Richards under it. The fractured and the latter's thigh was broken in two places.

On the 9th Wm. Wilart, residing in Greensburg, was killed in a quarrel at the Pennsylvania Station by the falling upon him a quantity of horsehair, which was crushed to death. He leaves a wife and three or four children, quite destitute.

Episcopal Visitation. The plan of the Episcopal visitation of the M. E. Church for 1888 has been published. The Central Ohio Conference will meet at the Episcopate on September 9th, Bishop Simpson presiding; the Cincinnati at Xenia, September 23rd, Bishop Baker presiding; the Erie at Ashland, July 18th, Bishop Simpson presiding; North Ohio, at Mt. Vernon, September 24th, Bishop Morris presiding; the Ohio at Lancaster, September 26th, Bishop Baker presiding, and the Pittsburgh at Colcheton, March 18th, Bishop James presiding.

Cheap John. This inimitable wit and salesman, who has such a happy knack of amusing people, is seen as popular as ever. His place is crowded every night, and if one is to judge by the uproar heard there, there must be something very funny going on. As General Ferrero's troops were falling back to make way for Colonel Barnes' brigade, it came into Col. Switzer's column. It was at first supposed by the latter's men that Col. Switzer had been captured and were rushing back to get out of danger. An instant more and our men would have been panic-stricken. Col. Switzer was equal to the emergency. He rallied his men in handsome style and recovered the line which, for a moment, had been broken. His presence of mind on his part, less coolness, less bravery, would doubtless have greatly altered the subsequent fortune of the day. In subsequent fighting he advanced his troops bravely, and the brigade acquitted itself with noble daring. Mr. Cunningham, Assistant Adjutant General of Col. Switzer's brigade, shot dead by his side, a bullet piercing his brain. Colonel Switzer was shot in the hand and Lieutenant Yale, of the staff, in the eye. Both were slightly hurt and they are still on duty. The Fourth Michigan regiment, Col. Lambert; Ninth and Sixty-second Pennsylvania, all added to their prior brilliant reputation of bold daring in front of the enemy.

The Pennsylvania Canal. The Harrington Patriot and Union say: The canal is in a favorable condition, and large numbers of boats daily pass through this city east and west. Should the present mild weather continue for several days the boats now on route will reach their destinations. We are not advised of the time fixed by the company for drawing of the water.

In the City. We understand that Col. J. B. Switzer, who was wounded in the hand at Fredericksburg, is in the city, having arrived yesterday from the army. His injury is not of a serious nature.

Capt. Gallope Safe. Gen. J. K. Moorehead telegraphed yesterday that Capt. George S. Gallope, reported killed at Fredericksburg, was "all right." We are rejoiced to learn that the report of his death is unfounded and hope he may arrive through all other battles in which he may take part.

Not Killed. It will be gratifying to many to know that a dispatch was yesterday received by Mr. George Amberger, announcing that Capt. Switzer's Adjutant General Jackson's staff was not killed, but wounded and a prisoner in the hands of the enemy. He was in the hands of the General, and was taken to the hospital. Jackson was killed and it was believed he was killed also, but afterwards turned out to be untrue.

THE VERY LATEST TELEGRAPH, FROM THE POTOMAC ARMY.

The Gunboat Cairo Blown Up. HEADQUARTERS ARMY OF THE POTOMAC, Dec. 18, 1862.

Yesterday the rebels sent under a flag of truce a request that we would bury our dead. A burying party accordingly went over and continued their labors until today.

During the truce, Col. Walton, chief of Longstreet's staff, informed our officers that the rebel infantry force engaged on Saturday front on Saturday was only two brigades, but that they had large reserves near by.

He said our men exhibited the greatest bravery, but he considered the rebel position impregnable, and that a force of 600,000 would find it impossible to carry the heights in the face of their batteries.

The rebel loss is small compared with ours. Our losses heretofore reported have been considerably decreased by the arrival of stragglers.

The enemy took nearly 800 prisoners from us, a considerable portion of which was absent from the camps when we evacuated the south side of the river.

The prisoners taken on both sides have been paroled. Mr. Mallory, present to Senator Grant, was in New York, and referred to report for duty, the former to Gen. Grant in the Department of the Tennessee, and the latter to General Dix, at Fort Monroe.

The joint committee of Congress on the Conduct of the War, pursuant to Senator Wilkinson's resolution adopted yesterday, last, Washington to-night to inquire into the conduct of the late operations of the army, and to report thereon.

The flag-of-truce was withdrawn to-night after all our dead were buried.
