COMMERCIAL INFORMATION

MOMEY MARKET. (CORRECTED DAILY FOR THE MORNING POST. The following are the buying and selling rates or Gold, Silver, &c.:

The market has been somewhat excited since our last report. Oil has advanced from our previous quotations to \$1.75, and we hear of one sale made this week at the Phillips Well, Tarr farm, of 1,000 bbls oil at \$2.00 \$ bbl. During the past and present weeks there have been three new wells struck. One on the Dilworth & Ewing farm of about 200 bbls per day; one on the Chapp farm of about 200 bbls per day; one on the Chapp farm of about 400 bbls; another on the Blood farm, amount of flow not known, as it has not yet been tested. Producers here are refusing to contract for delivery at Pittsburgh at 8c. We give as the ruing quotation \$1.75 per bbl at the wells, but, producers are refusing to sell at less than \$2, and are firm even at that figure. The stock on hand, both here and at the wells, is light.
