New York, October 12.—A special to the Times, dated Washington, October 11th, says: As some time have been published statements that no reinforcements had reached him up to 8th, it may be said that advice from Chatterbox are satisfactory in this respect. He is not only stronger in the centre, but his flanks are now well protected by fresh troops.
