NEWS ITEMS.

NEVADA proposes to send half a ton of silver to the Mississippi Valley Sanitary Fair.

MORE snow fell at Keene, N. H., during the first three days of last week than during the whole of last winter.

One hundred and forty-four buildings were destroyed by fire at Gonavies, Hayti, on the 7th inst., involving a loss of about five million dollars.

It has been ordered by the War Department that when tenasters and other employees of the Government refuse to go to the front, they shall forfeit all pay and allowances, and be liable to arrest and trial by a military tribunal according to the 60th Article of War.

The Republican Convention at Washington, Va., has voted down the resolutions in favor of the delegates to vote for Lincoln at Baltimore.

The House on Tuesday will not be law by the 1st of May.

PLATKA in Florida has been abandoned by its federal garrison. Nearly all the troops have been taken from Jacksonville and brought north.

A transport—the General Hunter—was blown up by a torpedo on the St. Johns river during the withdrawal of the Platka garrison.

THE importations for last week are the heaviest on record, and amount in the aggregate to between seven and eight millions. The importations for that week are greatly in excess of the corresponding season during the past two years.

The comparison stands thus—1862, \$3,342,564; 1863, \$4,922,012; 1864, \$7,468,327.

At Port Allegheny, Pa., a few days ago, a funeral procession was passing over a bridge to bury a child of Mr. Moore, when the bridge gave way.

The Washington correspondent of the X. Y. Herald, says there is much commotion in diplomatic circles here in regard to Franco-Mexican affairs.

GOVERNOR BRIDGES has issued an order calling the National Guard of Ohio to service, for one hundred days. They will be clothed, armed and equipped and paid by the United States Government, and report for duty May 2d.

THE whole number of National Banks in the country is now three hundred and eighty-three, with an aggregate capital of \$1,100,000,000. Though the amount of capital of the State bank in that city is greatly larger than that of the National Banks, the latter having the Government on their side cannot fail to exert a very commanding influence, and should the two systems form one, much confusion and injury may result.

Two steamers sailed from New York on Saturday for Liverpool, taking out the large sum of \$1,700,000 in coin. On this the New York Express remarks: "These shipments, heavy as they are, it is said, would have been much larger, but for the fact that the Government paid out on its sales small gold and the leading banking houses have offered 10 per cent. to exchange this for gold eagles, which are scarce. The double eagles are cashed on arrival at a fixed price, but the small coin suffers delay and expense in being sent to the mint. This large shipment of coin is another evidence of the extravagance of the country."
