Almost everything about the building is at-tractive, except the "solitary confinement." This of course is a terrible thought to the man or woman, who is daily accustomed to liberty. To be incarcerated in a cell for years, without the privilege of speaking to any person whatover, is certainly not a pleasant situation. This is what constitutes the punishment of the convict.
Otherwise the Penitentiary is an attractive place. The beautiful grass and trees in front the clear fountain of water, in which golden fishes are playing, the cleanliness of the halls and cells, the steam cooking department, the sweet and rich soup prepared for dinner, the mode of conveying it to the cell of each convict. the gas works, the luminary for lighting the tower and for throwing light around in [every don, are all worthy of mention, as peculiar and attractive. Each cell has a clean bed, table, desk and other conveniences, and is thoroughly ventilated, and furnished with steam pipes for heating, and gas for light. This gas is manufactured on the premises, at a great saving to

present, yet there is no doubt. that an additional wing is, or soon will be needed, as crime is

rapidly on the increase. We were pleased with the perfect accuracy of the books, showing all the particulars in regard to each convict, to the very kind, quantity and scription of clothing and personal effects in his possession at the time of entrance.

We were also gratified to know that there are PROVOST MARSHAL'S OPPICE, 24th Dis. PENN'A. but few female convicts now immured within its walls.
