JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSINC CERTAIN AMENDMENTS TO
THE CONSTITUTION. Be it rectived by the
Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met.
That the following amendments be proposed to
the Constitution of the Commonwealth, in accordance with the provisions of the tenth article
thereof:
There shall be an additional section to the
third article of the Conditution, to be designated as section four, as follows:
"Section 4. Whenever any of the qualified
alectors of this Commonwealth shall be in any
ectual military service, under the requisition
from the President of the United States, or by
the authority of this Commonwealth, such elec
gors may exercise the right of suffrage in al
elections by the citizens, under such regulations
as are, or shall be, prescribed by law, as fully as
if they were present at their usual place of election." It they were present at their usual place of election."

SECTION 2. There shall be two additional sections to the eleventh atticle of the Constitution, to be designated as sections eight and nine, as follows:

"SECTION 8. No bill shall be passed by the Leginature, containing more than one subject, which shall be clearly expressed in the title, except appropriation bills."

"SECTION 9. No bill shall be passed by the Legislature granting any powers, or privileges, a any case where the authority to grant such powers, or privileges, I as been, or may herealter be conferred upon the courts of this Commonwealth."
