Watchman Shot .- A Lientenant of the night watch was severely wounded in Alleghepears that two officers of the detective police in tracing him to a house on Robinson street. ectually secure him. They waited there so long that they finally attracted the attention of the night watch, two of whom on passing inquired who they were, and what was their business. The detectives returned a satisfactory answer, and the officers passed on. Shortly afterwards Lieutenant Machesney of the night watch came up, and put the same question to them. It seems that they did not explain themin a house, into which he demanded admission but was peremtorily refused. The watch then forced the door, and found the detectives, whom ensued, and during the affray a pistol was discharged from the hands of one of the detectives, inflicting a severe wound in the fleshy part of the thigh of the Lieutenant. The detectives were immediately put under arrest. One claims that the pistol was discharged accidentally, and was only at half cock at the time. In whatever way the accident happened, the detective should certainly be more careful in the use of tire arms, especially when an officer in the discrarge of his duty is concerned. They were both admitted to bail for the amount of \$2,000.

Night Watchman Wounded .- On Saturday night several fussy individuals met on the corner of Grant and Fifth streets, and created a disturbance to the great annoyance of the neighborhood. At last some difficulty arose among themselves, and a serious disturbance was menaced. Mr. McGrady of the night watch perceiving the state of things, and judging that he could not effectually attempt to arrest any of the party alone, dropped his mace as a sign for help. At this juncture a young man named Patrick Green, who was one of the most troublesome of the party attempted to make his escape Another watchman who had arrived in company with McCrady, endeavored to arrest the fugitive but ineffectually. McGrady then started after him and succeeded in catching him, when Green struck at him with a large carving knife, wound-ng him severely in the neck. Fortunately the knife was not sharp, or else the consequences might have proved fatal, especially as the wound is in the region of the carotid, or jugular artery, which once severed defies all remedy, and death is inevitable. The perpetrator of the deed immediately fled to his own house situated in the rear of Grant street, but on the officers arriving they surrounded the building and succeeded in arresting him. He was thenceforth conveyed to WAMELINK & BARR the watch house, and yesterday morning was committed in default of \$1,000 bail. Green is a young laboring man, stoutly built and capable of a great deal of endurance. He is only about two Bradbury and Schomacker & Co's years in this country and has not been married over six months. The wounded man is said to be out of all danger.

We understand that owing to a deficiency in the bounty fund, for which the newly enlisted men could not be rewarded immediately, several refused to be mustered into the service, but that evil being remedied, they again returned and were duly sworn in. There is a sufficient sum of money at present to pay all recruits, so that no one need be deterred from enlisting on this head.

Another Pittsburgher Dead .- It has been announced that Col. R. P. McDowell departed this life on Friday last in Washington City. Deceased was a native of Pittsburgh, and well known to our citizens, many of whom can claim his intimate friendship. Previous to the war breaking out he served a term in the legislature. and upon hostilities breaking out he was elected Colonel of a three months regiment, and immediately repaired to the field. On his return to this city after the expiration of his term he assisted in raising a cavalry company with whom he proceeded to Washington where he held a clerkship until his demise. His remains will be brought home for interment.
