LATEST BY TELEGRAPH. Official from Admiral Farragut.

Our Loss 40 Wounded and 80 Killed.

WASHINGTON, August 15.—Official dispatches have been received by the Navy Department from Admiral Farragut, dated Mobile, August 13th, confirming accounts heretofore received of our success there. After the Tennessee surrendered, the rebel gunboats Gaines and Morgan, succeeded in getting under protection of Fort Morgan. This terminated the action of the day.

Operations Before Mobile. Fort Gaines Evacuated. FORT POWELL BLOWN UP. A Rebel Ram Captured. 300 Prisoners Captured. Horrible Slaughter on the Selma. The Deck Covered with Dead and Wounded.

New York, August 15.—Farragut, in a letter to Commodore Palmer at New Orleans, says: "At an early hour on the 13th, our fleet, under the command of Commodore Farragut, sailed into the Pass, close under the guns of Fort Morgan, pouring in broadside after broadside of grape and canister, thus driving the gunners from their places, and leaving our vessels open only to the fire of the forts Gaines and Powell, which, of course, was less effective on account of the distance.

At the same time Granger's land batteries opened Fort Gaines and caused its evacuation and the blowing up of Fort Powell. In passing the forts the Oneda received a shot which temporarily disabled her machinery, but she was safely towed through the fire by her consort. Our monitor Tecumseh was sunk almost instantly, carrying down with it one hundred men, including Captain Granger.

The gunboats having passed out to reach of the forts, were pursued by the formidable rebel ram "Tennessee" and three iron-clads. The ram was immediately attacked and battered so effectually that he was obliged to surrender in a few minutes. The ram was but slightly injured. Lieut. Prentiss, of the Monitor, lost both of his legs, and Captain Maloney, of the Oneda, lost an arm.

New York, August 15.—The Herald's correspondent of Mobile says that when the Selma surrendered she had lost forty men. Her deck was covered with the dead and dying, and her seamen ran with blood. Her commander, Lieut. Comstock, formerly of the United States Navy, was lying dead across the breach of a gun, with his bow in the water.

"Tennessee" attempted to avoid the monitor, and made for the wooden ships, but the flag ship and Monongahela followed her. The latter struck the "Tennessee" amidships with her terrible power, causing the huge rebel monitor to reel like a drunken man. The "Tennessee" then grappled the "Tennessee," but further resistance was saved by the latter holding a white flag. The same horrible slaughter was visible here as on the Selma.

Captain Garret now commands the captured ram. We captured near three hundred prisoners. Our army has possession of Dauphin Island. The Herald says that the rebels were more than any other army, and that they were more than any other army.
