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



By our law it is provided that the polls shall be opened in every civil district in each county in the State, but the proclamation provides only for their being at one place in each county. This provision would put out of the power of many legal voters to exercise the elective franchise.

We solemnly protest against these infringements of our law conflicting as they do, with the very letter of the Federal Constitution besube they are without authority, and because they will eral Constitution because they are without authority, and because they will prevent a free, fair, and true expression of the will of the loyal people of Tennessee. But we protest still more emphatically against this most tunsual and impracticable test oath which it is proposed to require of all citizen voters in Tennessee.

I solemnly swear that I will henceforth support the Constitution of the United States, and defend it against the assaults of its enemies, that I am an acassaults of its enemies; that I am an ac-tive friend of the "government of the United Biates," and the criemy of the so-called Confederate Biates, that I ardent-ly desire the suppression of the rebel-lion against the government of the United Biates; that I sincerely rejoice in the triumph of the armies and navies of the United States, and in the defeat and Lincoln responded:

"May I inquire how long it took you and the New York politicians to concert that paper?"

I replied, "it was concected in Nash ville, without communication with any but Tennessee. We communicated with citizens of Tennessee, outside of Nash ville, but not with New York politicians."

"I will answer," said Mr. Lincoln emphatically, "that I expect to let the friends of George B. McClellan manage in white their side of the contest in their own way; and I will manage my side of it in my way."

"May we ask an answer in writing," I suggested.
