

The National Banks. From the report of the Currency, we learn that during the past year two hundred and eighty-two new National Banks have been organized, and one hundred and sixty-eight State Banks changed into National ones. The whole number of National Banks now in existence is five hundred and eighty-four. istence is five hundred and eighty four, divided among twenty-seven States and Territories. The capital stock paid into these Banks amounts to \$108,964,597 28; the circulation \$65,864,25, and the bonds to secure that circulation \$81,-961,450.

In speaking of the tendency to infla tion in connection with this currency question, Mr. McCullough says: But, while the national currency act is restrictive in its general provisions. and is expected when generally adopted to prevent expansions, there is still danger that too much capital will be invested under the suspension of specie payments, and in the existing unsettled, condition of our political payments, and in the existing unsettled, condition of our political and financial affairs. When money is plenty and fortunes are being rapidly acquired, the country is always in a feverish and unhealthy state. This is especially true at the present time. The enormous expenditures of the Government, and the great advance in prices since the expenditures of the Government, and the great advance in prices since the commencement of the war, have made many persons suddenly rich, and upon fortunes suddenly acquired have followed reckless expenditures, extravagance, waste. Speculation is taking the place of sober and persevering industry, and, thousands are deluded with the notion that the wealth of the nation in being

that the wealth of the ustion in being increased by the increase of its indebted ness. The inauguration of a new system of banking, under such circumstan-ces, is occuliarly hazardous, and I have been, from the time of my appointment, more apprehensive that too many banks would be organized than that the sysem would not be sufficiently attractive to induce capitalists to become connect ed with it. The Government is the great borrower. Its obligations cor pose a large portion of the discount line of the banks, which are making large profits of Government securities at little apparent risk, and the danger is, that the national banking system, with all its restrictions, may, during the suspension of specie payments, and the continuance of the war, add to the plethora of paper of specie payments, and the continuance of the war, add to the plethors of paper money; and that, when the war is over, the banks, deprived of the existing means of investment in Government obligations, and finding no legitimate use for their capitals, may be tempted to use them in encouraging operatious that

The banks ought to be compelled by law to retain a part, if not all the coin received by them, for interest on their gold bearing bonds, in order that they may be prepared to lend their influence in favor of a return to specie payment, and some provisions should be introduced by which, when specie payments are resumed excessive innormants are resumed excessive innormants. payments are resumed, excessive impor-tations of goods may be checked and dangerous exportations of coin may be It was of the greatest importance that

the national currency system should be independent of politics and freed from political influences. To effect this, and to facilitate the business of the hanks with the Comptroller, I am clearly of the opinion that the bureau should be made an independent department, and removed from Washington to Philadelphia or The French Mission.

The papers whisper Mr. Blair's name, but say the Senate will not confirm him.
