The medals—We are sorry to observe that the medals sent out by Dr. McClintock, are likely to cause some ill feeling among the competitors, before they are disposed of in the manner intended by the donor.

We understand that the resolutions adopted at a recent meeting of one of the companies, accusing Gen. Davis of making the arrangements to sell the views of another company, do great injustice to that gentleman. On consultation with Col. Travolta, he adopted such regulations as would give all the companies that were present at Camp Fayette, an opportunity of competing for the prizes.
