The Kaskaskia, (Ili.) Republican, of Saturday week, notices the death, in that vicinity of Mr John Stufflebean, aged 109 years. He was born on the banks of the Hudson river, twelve miles from Albany, in the State of New York, February 15th, 1735.— There he married his first wife, whom he left with two children, when he enlisted as a private in the Revolutionary army, in which he served almost to the close of the war, when he was taken captive by the Indians who disposed of him to the British for a barrel of rum. Having remained a prisoner at Detroit a few months. while employed one day chopping wood, he and five of his fellow prisoners effected their escape, and only reached the Colonial settlements after three months of perilous adventure through the woods of a section of country that now constitutes the States of Ohio, Indiana and Michigan. He was subsequently one of the first settlers in Bourbon county, Kentucky, and assisted in sawing with a whip saw, the planks used in constructing the first permanent frame building there erected. He was blessed with a fine flow of animal spirits, and was generally cheerful. His syesight was unim-paired, almost to the last, and he never had occasion for the use of spectacles. He never took a dose of medicine, and with the exception of the four days illness, immediately preceding his death, he was never sick, at least not seriously so. His wife, aged 82
