IRON SHIPS. A very important subject is now under discussion as to the preference of Iron over Timber vessels, and the best informed men and the most practical talent of Europe and the United States, will be brought to ration of the question. It is not Iron steamors alone, but Iron ships of war of a certain size, and Iron merchant vessels which will constitute the subject of this examination or controversy. There is no deficiency of ship timber which renders the use of ble, but it is ascertained as far as relates to ships of war of the United States that the re pairs of a Government vessel in sixteen years equal the Brandywice, Frigate, built in 1825, at an expense of \$290,218, had expended upon her in repairs in the course of thirteen years, no less than \$377,665. The Falmouth, built in 1827, cost \$94,093, and the repair in fourteen years amount to \$226,120. It is comp ted that the repairs alone of these three ships, in a riod of less than sixteen years, amounting to \$1,992,-248, would have built six Iron Steam Ships of War, each equal to any Frigate in force and efficiency. No wonder, at these rates, so many millions are annual required to keep our navy in repair and affoat. A just and proper economy, under these considera-tions, require a suspension of all costly repairs to our ships of the line, because it is far preferable to lay up those thips and appropriate the \$150,000 required for repairs to the erection of steam Frigates, Iron or Wood na shall be deemed advisable. In a few years we may

as shall be deemed advisable. In a few years we may have a fleet of Steam Frigutes built out of the econo-Ships of great length exactly safe; 300 feet, the length of the bear steamer Great Britain, we apprehend, is Pittsburgh workmen, and are warranted to be of too long and may be apt to hog, but Iron Steam Ships

SUPERIOR QUALITY 160 to 200 feet in length, with the greatest attention to the thickness of the Iron plates and knees, we should consider a proper and safe length. Two accidents have happened to two Iron steamers, one a Govern-ment vessel near Madagascar, which nearly collapsed and was only saved by strengthening pieces screwed up to the sides; the other, the Eberfelt, a small steam er intended for river navigation which foundered a sca in an attempt to reach England. There may have been other accidents, but generally speaking, the Iron boats have been quite successful, and it is decidedly interest of Government to stop repairs on old vessols and proceed gradually to supply their places by Iron Steam Ships of War.
