Acquitted.—Daniel Adams has had his trial at Raymond, Miss., for the murder of Dr. James Hagan, editor of the Vicksburg Sentinel, and was acquitted by the jury.

An Organ Family are giving Concerts in Philadelphia to crowd houses.

Mr. George McDuffie has reconsidered his resolution to resign his seat in the Senate of the United States. He will remain until the close of the next session.

The Daaville, Va. paper, says an iron company at that place is erecting a new rolling mill which will be the largest in the United States, and will cost \$100,000. It is estimated that it will turn out annually about 10,000 tons manufactured iron.

SALLY MILLER.—The trial which has been going on for some time in the District Court of Louisiana, in which Sally Miller sued John F. Miller, on the plea that she was a white woman of German parentage, unjustly held in slavery, has been decided in favor of the defendant, annulling and denying all the claims set up by the plaintiff to her freedom, and all damages claimed for servitude. Her counsel filed a motion for a new trial, on the ground of newly discovered evidence favorable to the plaintiff. The motion was fixed for hearing on Saturday, the 6th of July.

LOUISIANA ELECTION. We received to day the New Orleans papers, dated the morning of the 4th inst. The elections held there during the country parties, closing on the morning of the 3rd, can be regarded as successful, but few returns. The following from the New Orleans Freypress contains what we can rely on, except the returns of Congress for the Parish of Jefferson, which we have furnished elsewhere: Lathrop (No. 514) 210 votes (214) 230. Messrs. Gill and Duvall (4 members) are elected to Congress from the 1st and 2d congressional districts without opposition.

"By the election returns received last evening from the Parish of St. Bernard we learn that the Hon. Gilbert Lewis, dem. crat., assumed a grand duty in the convention, and Mr. A. Legrand, who courageously represented the parish in the convention, succeeded without opposition. Mr. Manuel W. Bogue, dem. crat., was elected to the State Senate without opposition. Mr. Gant, whig, on the list of the House of Representatives, was elected by 121 majority over his opponent, Mr. Herndon.

"In the precinct of Algiers, Mr. Labranche received 92 votes, and Mr. Tibbodeux 9."

We copy the following items from the Lafayette, La., Journal of the 4th inst: The river has been higher than ever. At this moment of writing this, 110 o'clock A. M., on Wednesday, there is 24 feet in the channel. It is falling, however—having been several feet higher. There will be no crops in the low lands, or river and creek bottoms. Thousands of acres have been stripped of their fencing, and the crops drowned out. The Washaw has been higher within the past week, than it had been before for many years. The damage done is incalculable. The canal will not be in readiness for navigation about a month; the last rains having added disaster to disaster. McJennett's saw and grist mill is in the mouth of Big Pine, on Thursday or Friday last, found for the lower country—freighted with about 4000 bushels of wheat. Loss to proprietors some five or six thousand dollars.

We find the following paragraph in the Spirit of the Times of the 10th. Comment is unnecessary: "What is the Honor?—It is a good joke that while this Hon. Doe is in the State prison, for endeavoring to prevent a British clause, the Governor of Rhode Island who opposed him, Samuel Ward, King, is a charge of sedition, for giving \$50,000 of the funds of the Rhode Island Agricultural Bank. The Whigs can probably tell us which man—of the two Governor, Doe and King—is most deserving of the lion's tamed garments."

THE undersigned Commissioners named in the 14th Act of Assembly passed the 30th day of April, 1844, entitled "An Act to authorize the Governor to incorporate the Delaware Canal Company," hereby give notice that in pursuance of the provisions of the said Act, they will meet at the Merchants' Exchange in the City of Philadelphia, on MONDAY, the 5th day of August, at 10 o'clock, A. 1st. The Delaware Division of the Pennsylvania Canal shall be divided into twenty-five thousand shares, of one hundred dollars each.

2d. 3d. Each purchaser, at the time of his purchase, shall deposit with the Commissioners the premiums or advance above the par value of the shares by him purchased, or if the bid or bids do not amount to five dollars per share, above the par value of the share or shares by him purchased, then and in such case the purchaser shall pay five dollars on account, and in part of each share thus purchased, the said sums shall be paid in money, (or in the certificates of loan of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, at the option of the purchaser.)

4th. Payment for the remainder of the purchase money will be required to be made within thirty days from the purchase, under the forfeiture for delinquency of the amount paid to the Commissioners at the time of sale.

5th. A transfer to the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania of certificates of the loans of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, to an equal amount will be received by the State Treasurer in payment for the shares of stock purchased, and any money deposited with the Commissioners at the sale, will also be debited by the State Treasurer for a transfer of the said loans to the Commonwealth, to an equal amount.
