

and necessary. The only establishment of the sort now connected with the service is located at Boston and the advantages of a similar establishment, convenient to the hazy growing regions, must be apparent to all.

The report of the Secretary presents other matters to your consideration, of an important character in connection with the service.

In referring to the accompanying report of the Postmaster General, it affords me continued cause of gratification to be able to advert to the fact that the affairs of the Department, for the last four years, have been so conducted as, from its unaided resources, to meet its large expenditures. On my coming into office, a debt of nearly \$500,000 existed against the Department, which Congress discharged by an appropriation from the Treasury. The Department, on the 4th of March next, will be found, under the management of the present efficient head, free of debt or embarrassment, which could only have been done by the observance and practice of the greatest vigilance and economy.

The laws have contemplated, throughout, that the Department should be self-sustained; but it may become necessary, with the wisest regard to public interests, to introduce amendments and alterations in the system. There is a strong desire manifested in many quarters, so to alter the tariff of letter postage as to reduce the amount of tax at present levied. Should such a measure be carried into effect, to the full extent desired, it cannot well be doubted that, for the first four years of its operation, a diminished revenue would be collected, the sum of which would necessarily constitute a charge upon the Treasury.

Whether such a result would be desirable, it will be for Congress, in its wisdom, to determine. It may in general be asserted that radical alterations in any system should rather be brought gradually in by piecemeal changes, and by pursuing this prudent policy in the reduction of letter postage, the Department might still sustain itself, through the revenue which would accrue by the increased circulation of the State and condition of the public Treasury has, heretofore, been such as to have precluded the recommendation of any material change. The difficulties upon this head have, however, ceased, and a large discretion is now left to the Government.

I cannot too strongly urge the policy of authorizing the establishment of a line of steamships regularly to ply between this country and foreign ports, and upon our own waters for the transportation of the mail. The example of the British Government is well worthy of imitation in this respect. The belief is strongly entertained that the emoluments arising from the transportation of mail matter to foreign countries, would operate as an inducement to cause individual enterprise to undertake this branch of the task; and the remuneration of the Government would consist in the addition readily made to our steam navy in case of emergency by the ships so employed.

Should this suggestion meet your approval, the propriety of placing such ships under the command of experienced officers of the Navy, will not escape your observation. The application of steam to the purpose of naval warfare, cogently recommends an extensive steam marine as important in estimating the defenses of the country. Fortunately, this may be attained by us to a great extent without incurring any large amount of expenditure. Steam vessels engaged in the transportation of the mail, or other principal water courses, lakes, and other parts of our coast, could also be so constructed as to be efficient war vessels when needed, and would of themselves constitute a formidable force in order to repel attacks from abroad.

We cannot be blind to the fact, that other nations have already sailed large numbers of steamships to their naval armaments, and that this new and powerful agent is destined to revolutionize the condition of the world. The United States, therefore, looking to their security, to adopt a similar policy; and the plan suggested will enable them to do so at a small comparative cost.

I take the greatest pleasure in bearing testimony to the zeal and untiring industry which has characterized the conduct of the members of the Executive Cabinet. Each, in his appropriate sphere, has rendered me the most efficient aid in carrying on the Government, and it will not, I trust, appear out of place for me to bear this public testimony. The cardinal objects which should ever be held in view by those entrusted with the administration of public affairs, are rigidity, and without favor or affection, to interpret the national will, expressed in the laws, as that justice should be done to every citizen to all. This has been the rule upon which they have acted; and thus it is believed that few cases, if any exist, wherein our fellow citizens, or from some time have been drawn to the State of Government for the settlement of their transactions with the Government, have gone away dissatisfied; where the testimony has been taken, and was esteemed satisfactory, their claims have been promptly satisfied; and in the absence of all favoritism or partiality.

The government which is not just to its own people, can neither claim their affection, nor the respect of the world. At the same time the closest attention can be paid to these matters, while they relate immediately to the great concerns of the country. Order and efficiency in each branch of the public service have prevailed, accompanied by a system of the most rigid responsibility on the part of the receiving and distributing agents. The fact, in illustration of the truth of this remark, deserves to be noticed, that the revenues of the Government amounting in the last four years to upwards of \$120,000,000, have been collected and disbursed through the numerous Governmental agents, without loss, by default, or any account, worthy of serious comment.

The appropriations made by Congress for the improvement of the rivers of the West, and of the harbors on the lakes, are in a course of judicious expenditure under suitable agents; and are destined, it is to be hoped, to realize all the benefits designed to be accomplished by Congress. I cannot however sufficiently impress on Congress the great importance of withholding appropriations from improvements which are not ascertained, by previous examination and survey, to be necessary for the shelter and protection of trade from the dangers of storms and tempests. Without this precaution, the expenditures are but too apt to enure to the benefit of individuals, without reference to the only consideration which can render them constitutional—the public interest and the general good.

I cannot too earnestly urge upon you the interests of this District, over which, by the Constitution, Congress has exclusive jurisdiction. It would be deeply to be regretted should there be, at any time, ground to complain of neglect on the part of a community which, detached as it is from the paternal care of the States of Virginia and Maryland, can only expect aid from Congress, as its local legislature. Amongst the subjects which claim your attention, is the prompt organization of an asylum for the insane, who may be found, from time to time, adjoining within the District. Such course is also demanded by considerations which apply to branches of the public service. For the necessities in this behalf, I invite your particular attention to the report of the Secretary of State.

I have this, gentlemen of the two Houses of Congress, presented you a true and faithful picture of the condition of public affairs, both foreign and domestic. The welfare of the public service are made known to you; and matters of no ordinary importance are urged upon your consideration. Shall I not be permitted to congratulate you on the happy auspices under which you have assembled; and at the important change in the condition of things which has occurred in the last three years?—During that period, questions of foreign powers, of vital importance to the peace of the country, have been settled and adjusted. A desolating and wasting war with savage tribes, has been brought to a close. The internal tranquility of the country, threatened by agitating questions, has been preserved.

The credit of the Government, which had experienced a temporary embarrassment, has been restored; and its coffers, which for a season were emptied, have been replenished. A currency nearly uniform in its

value has taken the place of one depreciated and almost worthless. Commerce and manufactures, which had suffered in common with every other interest, have since more revived—and the whole country exhibits an aspect of prosperity and happiness. Trade and barter, no longer governed by a wild and speculating mania, rest upon a solid and substantial footing, and the rapid growth of our cities, in every direction, bespeak most strongly the favorable circumstances by which we are surrounded.

My happiness, in the retirement which shortly will be mine, is the ardent hope which I experience, that this state of prosperity is neither deceptive nor destined to be short lived; and that measures which have not yet received the sanction, but which I cannot regard as closely connected with the honor, the glory, and still more enlarged prosperity of the country, are destined, at an early day, to receive the approval of Congress. Under these circumstances, and with these anticipations, I shall most gladly leave to others, more able than myself, the noble and pleasing task of sustaining the public property.

I shall carry with me into retirement the gratifying reflection that, as my sole object throughout has been to advance the public good, I may not entirely have failed in doing it; and this gratification is heightened in no small degree by the fact that when, under a deep and abiding sense of duty, I have myself constrained to resort to the qualified veto, it has never been followed by a disapproval on the part of the People, nor weakened in any degree their attachment to that great conservative feature of our Government.

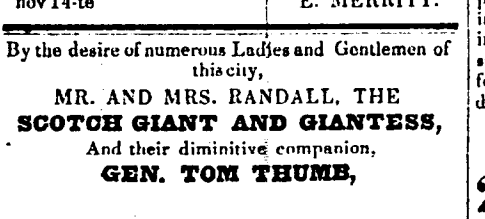

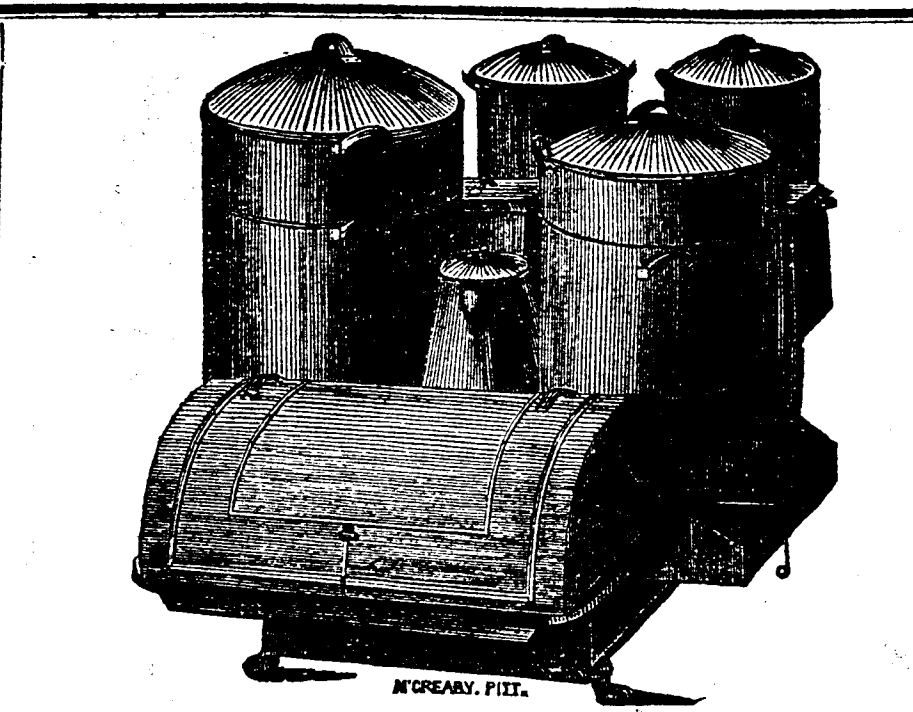
