We are sorry after the general praise we have so heartily bestowed on the Review, that we should be obliged to deal out special censure so soon. But the first article in the number, "The Late Acting President," is not to our taste. Like every thing that appears editorial in the Review, it is handsomely written, but it is sadly out of place in a work which is noted for the dignified and liberal manner in which it expresses its opinions.

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GRAND WIND FALLEN.—The St. Louis New Era has the following announcement.—We have it from a reliable source, that a German farmer, by the name of George J. Geper, living near the village of Lewisburg, Fulton county, Illinois, is about to start on a trip to Europe, for the purpose of taking possession of the sum of two million six hundred thousand dollars worth of property. He recently received a letter from the firm of Bushbills, at Frankfort, stating that a law suit which had been pending in the courts of Germany for more than thirty years, and in which his wife was one of the best of law, had been decided in his favor; and that a division of the amount in litigation, was about to take place, and they wished to know his pleasure concerning the amount coming to his wife, which is stated to be in round numbers two million six hundred thousand dollars. Geper emigrated to this country fifteen years ago, and settled in Fulton county, where he followed the occupation of a farmer. At the time he left Germany, the date of the suit was considered doubtful.

The Iron District.—The Iron district, which spreads through New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Maryland, and West Virginia, traverses regions unexplored with coal, and abounding in a store of iron, and particularly in Pennsylvania, however, we must chief attention, where two fifths of all the iron of the United States is made. The United States contains 30,000 square miles of coal, which is about sixteen times as great as the coal measures of Europe. A single one of these gigantic masses runs from Tennessee to Alabama, and must embrace, itself, 50,000 square miles. Out of fifty counties of Pennsylvania, there are 46,000 square miles of Pennsylvania, which are rich in iron. There are 10,000 miles of coal and iron in Pennsylvania alone as great as that of Great Britain, and they have the advantage of lying near the water-level; while those of the latter are in the interior of the country, and are separated by the surface, and are excavated through subterranean passages.
