FURTHER PARTICULARS

We have just returned from an hour's walk amon the ruins of the disastrous conflagration. Frightful as was the progress of the flames, and terrible as the havoc seemed, while it was going on, no one can real-It's the losses and privations our citizens have sustained, until he walks through the forest of naked chimneys, and broken walls which mark the path of the destroying element. Of the 1200 houses which were estimated as the number lost, about 700 were dwelthrown out of house and home. Fortunately the weather, though somewhat cool, has been dry, and thus the removal of property was less difficult, and the sufferings of those who had to remain exposed in the air, less severe than they would otherwise have been. The whole length of the burnt district is about one mile; the average breadth about 160 yards; making

an area of about 60 acres. We mentioned that one woman, Mrs. BROOKS, was burned, in her house, in Third street. We have heard of no other loss of life, though fears are entertained for SAMURL KINGSTON, Esq., and Mr. John Johnston, of Allegheny city, who have not been seen by their friends since the fire. Their relatives had heard nothing of them up to last evening. It is most sur wiking that so few persons should have been killed or injured, when we recal the swift progress of the flames, and the terrible confusion which was caused by the efforts of the people to save their property-carts, cara, drays, wagons, in short, every sort of venicle was puttin requisition, and was driven through the streets at fearful speed. Before our office, the vehicles were often jammed together in a way which seemed to render certain losses of life or limb-yet no accident

Yesterday the vaults of the Bank of Pittsburgh Tound almost uninjured. The Iron Safes of Mr A. KRAMER and Sinser & Jones, Brokers, were also opened, and all their contents were well preserved. Already are men busy at work in recovering from the ruins, Iron, and other articles worth digging out; and we saw many busy with hatchets cutting the plaster from the fallen bricks, preparatory to re-building!-Such indomitable energy is worthy of all admiration, it is a prominent truit in the character of our citizens, and gives cheering evidence that we shall soon regain our prosperity, in spite of the terrible calamity we have endured.
