RELIEF TO PITTSBURGH.—The North Carolina states that on the 26th ult., at a town meeting of the citizens of Fayetteville, the sum of \$250 was appropriated for the relief of the Pittsburgh sufferers.

THE Philadelphia Committee for the relief of the sufferers in this city, were to have closed their labors on Saturday. It is thought that the contributions will reach nearly \$50,000.
