PITTSBURGH BOARD OF TRADE. COMMITTEE FOR JOSE.

CITY MATTERS.—In the Select Council, on Wednesday evening, Mr. EICHBAUM presented a Reso-

lution authorizing the Aqueduct Committee to take the

Acqueduct from Mr. RUSSELL, the Contractor. A

report was also presented from Messrs Wade & Eich-

baum, stating that Mr. Boehling had fully complied

with his contract, and in some instances more than

complied with it. These papers, so creditable to the

Contractor, were read through and laid over.

A resolution was adopted and sent to C. C. author-

izing the city Registrar to make a map, showing the

course of the Water and Gas Pipes, and the lo-

cation of structures of the Fire Pipes and Gas Lamps.

A resolution appropriating \$100 to the cleaning

and repairing of the Canal, from 7th street to the

Monongahela River, was also adopted.

The Common Council a resolution authorizing the

Water Committee to have forty new fire-plugs put

down at such places as the Engine and Gas Commit-

tee may direct. It was adopted.

The resolution of the S. C. above noted, about maps

of the Pipes, &c. was adopted.

The Report of Messrs Wade & EICHBAUM was

adopted and entered at large upon the minutes, and

a vote of thanks passed.
