DOWN-TOWN.—Yesterday afternoon, two young boys, supposed to be about ten years of age, were in the Allegheny river near the outlet of the Canal, bathing. One of them, named Ferguson, got under a flat, and the other, endeavoring to save him, came very near being taken under also. A gentleman on the bridge seeing their perilous situation hastened to their relief, and with the aid of a plank, succeeded in getting one of them out on a plank. The other, after receiving the flat, was got out by a boy diving after him; in an apparently lifeless state he was taken to a neighboring house, and when our informant left, was recovering.

ON YESTERDAY afternoon while one of our citizens was engaged with a boat a short distance from the house in the Allegheny river, near the old Bridge, a Pitt full grown inch in length in attempting to swim upon a smaller sized fish, actually jumped in the boat, and was instantly captured.

ARREST OF THE RIFTERS.—We learn that yesterday afternoon the city police arrested six of the leaders in the riot at the Circus, on Monday night, and in search of others. We hope the proper authorities will sever these rioters from a plank, and one of those engaged in the disgraceful proceedings of Monday night are dealt with according to law. The gentlemen composing the Equitation Company, we learn, acted very prudently throughout the whole scene.
