The Wyandot Corn—Great Field.
The first stage of the project was first introduced to the public in 1884, by Mrs. J. Thomas, of Watervliet, Illinois, who received a grant from the Wyandot Indians through a California emigrant, who planted in a sandy soil, and the product was fifty-eight full grown ears, thirty on the 20th of May, one hundred and thirty-two ears and from one-fourth of an acre planted two bushels and three pecks of shelled corn. It only required the common cultivation given to this kind of corn.

First, it requires but one grain to be planted in each hill, more than one is needless. Second, each grain yields from three to eight full grown stalks, equal in length and strength, being from nine to twelve feet high, and ripened directly from the grain. Third, each stalk bears from five to four ears, the most of which is equal in appearance to that manufactured from wheat. Each hill will yield from one to two bushels of grain on a square quantity of soil planted, it will produce double the quantity of ears that can be raised from any other kind of corn grown. The quantity of fodder which it bears is immense, and the grain feeding it is superior to the "yellow field" or "corn" that is raised. The quantity of grain that it bears is equal to that of any other kind of corn raised in this section of the country, and it will produce 200 bushels of grain on a square quantity of soil planted, it will produce double the quantity of ears that can be raised from any other kind of corn grown.
