INCREASE OF THE NAVY.

The difficulties with England, whether actually settled or not, may have a good effect on this country. It will draw public attention to the fact of the miserable inefficiency of our navy for the purpose of national defense. This nation has about thirteen hundred miles of coast on the Atlantic and the Gulf of Mexico.

This nation has now more ships and steamers and ironclads than any other nation on the globe. The value of our shipping and commerce is immense; and it is scattered over all the seas and oceans. And yet for its protection we have not over eighty war vessels of all classes, and one-third of them generally are not in commission or for immediate service.

It is suddenly becoming between this country and either England or France the value of ships and freight is nearly all classes, and in a twelve-month, would five times exceed the cost of such a navy as would render a war with any nation an impossible event.

The census of Alabama, under a special law, has just been taken, from which we learn that the white population is 400,979; in negroes 211,141; slaves 221,200; free persons of color 2,170; or a total of 825,190. In 1850 the population was 723,222; the free negroes 10,241; slaves 243,144; and 2,225 free colored persons.

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THE NEWS.

The two most interesting of them is Gordon has arrived in a steamer from St. Louis, 11; reported they have confessed the deed.

The missing steamer Pacific sailed from Liverpool on the 23d of January, and is, therefore, on thirty-eight days. It was forty-nine days to force the Atlantic, and from there met with the disaster that occurred to her a few years ago.
