Judges' Salaries in Onio .- An adjourned meeting of the Hamilton county bar, for the purpose of taking measures to increase the salaries of the Supreme Court and Common Pleas Judges in Ohio was held on Tuesday last. Statements were then made that petitions to accomplish the proposed end, which had been circulated, were signed by not only the members of the bar, but also by nearly every citizen who had been solicited. One of the speakers-Judge Probasco-remarked that there were about twenty-five hundred suits brought annually in each Common Pleas district, and if a very small tax fee were charged as a condition precedent to the bringing of the suit, it would afford a fund

sufficient to pay every Judge in the State an adequate compensation. A committee was then appointed to take further action on the subject. passed requiring a fee of one dollar to be paid prior to the commencement of any, suit by th county treasury and appropriated to the payment of the salaries of the Supreme and Common Pleas Court Judges." The compensation o the Judiciary in Ohio is much less than in this State. The salaries of the Supreme Bench offi cers is \$1,500, if we are not mistaken.

WEIGHT OF A BUSHEL OF COAL IN KENTUCKY The late Kentucky Legislature fixed the weight of a bushel of bituminous coal at eighty pounds. whilst that of cannel coal has been reduced seventy pounds. As the cannel is fully as heavy as bituminous, the justness of making a difference of the pounds in the weight of a bushel of each is not very obvious. The Louisville Courier says there is but a very small quantity of the Pitts burgh coal that will weigh seventy-six pounds t the measured bushel, that being the required weight under the present law. The addition therefore, of four pounds to the bushel, in a boa load of 15,000 bushels, will make a difference of near 800 bushels, which will be a loss coal men cannot submit to, and will result in the abolition of the weighing system, or force them to sell ! the ton, without regard to bushels.
