CIVIL WAR IN KANSAS. From all accounts received it seems pret certain that Kansas is now in a state of civil war. The town of Lawrence is said to be nearly destroyed, and several are known to have been killed. Mr. Reeder made several inflammatory speeches urging the people to resist the execution of the laws, and then fled, and is supposed to have reached a place of safety. The Missourians, it is said, have gone, uncalled, in large numbers into the territory, and are committing depredations. Governor Shannon should have first employed the United States troops to drive them back to their homes, and then marched direct to Lawrence and made the arrest of every man against whom writs were issued, at all hazards. If the people of Lawrence had made resistance, then they would have been futterly without excuse. But to permit another Missouri invasion is contrary to the express instructions of the President in his proclamation and orders. The peace of the territory was to be preserved, the laws executed, and an "invasive aggression" prevented. And to enable the Governor to discharge these duties effectually the military force was placed at his disposal. Each purpose was equally important, and to prevent all ground of complaint the Missourians should at once have
