TERRIBLE TORNADO IN FRANKLIN COUNTY, N .-Between 300 and 400 Houses Damaged .-One of the peculiarities of the storms this summer is that they usually end in a tornado. We have had an uncommon number of hurricanes, destroying a large amount of property. Next in destructiveness to that in Philadelphia last May, is a storm which occurred on Monday of last week in Franklin county, New
