From Washington. Washington, August 13.—There is no truth in the report that Judges Lecompte and Cato, of Kan-sas, had been requested to resign, nor have they been removed; neither is there any ground for the state-

ment that the prosecutions in Kansas for treason and other crimes, are to be quashed. The Governorship of Kansas was not accepted by Mr. Geary on any such considerations as has been alleged. The Senate was in executive session more than three hours to day, and ratified the treaties between Austria and Baden for the extradition of criminals; Nicaragua: the latter was made with the former government. The treaty with the Sandwich Islands was considered, but not finally acted on. The official documents show that Honduras has refused to receive the United States commercial agent, un-til indubitably convinced of the authenticity of his commission, but permitting him to remain, provided that his conduct furnish no ground of complaint in relation to questions which agitate that part of Cen tral America against the fillibusters who have vently seized on Nicaragua.
