Regular Meeting of Councils. The Select and Common Councils, metlast evening building, which have now been permanently arranged. A very handsome carpet has been put down in each Chamber, and a railing erected to separate speciators rom members of Council during their deliberations.

In Select Council Mr. McAuley in the Chair.

A memorial from Wood, Morrill & Co., asking an additional appropriation for constructing a railroad track on the wharf—was referred to the Mononghela n the Allegheny, Mononghela and Ohio Rivers, with a resolution, requesting the Senators and Representa-tives, to present the act to the Legislature for adoption was read. The act was adopted, and the resolu ion read three times, and passed. In Common Council action concurred in.

The railroad ordinance came in from Common ouncil, and their action was concurred in by the folwing vote: Ayes Mesere. Berger, Kammerer, Kim, Mackin. Miller, Morrow, Moorhead, Torten and Ward-9. Nays-Messrs. Bonnett, Browe, M'Cargo and M' Auley, President .- 4.

In Common Council, Mr. McKelvy in the Chair. A petition was presented, from citizens of the Third Ward, asking for a gas lamp on the corner of Grant and High streets. Referred to Committee on Gas Lamps. A petition was presented from citizen of the Fift Ward, asking for the extension of the Gas Mains from Adams to Carson streets, on Liberty, provided the vania. Pennsylvania Rrilroad Company erects the necessary mps, and pays for the gas consumed by them. Reerred to Gas Committee. A petition from the Sixth Ward for Gas Lamps on Vebster street, was referred to Gas Committee A petition from the Seventh Ward asking for the rading and paving of the upper part of Webster street as referred to the Committee on grading and paving.

The Committee on City Printing presented a reort, with a resolution asking for an appropriation of \$3,000. The report was accepted.

A bill of J. W. M'Carthy for \$3,00, and a bill of Maffett & Old for \$30,69, were presented. The first was referred to the Committee on Claims and Acunts; the other to the Market Committee. A petition from the last meeting of Select Council king for a gas lamp on the corner of Gum and Webster streets, which had been referred to the Gas Committee, was concurred in. A report from the Committe on City property, ask.

ing for information concerning the Relief engine ouse, which was at the last meeting of Select Couneil referred back to the Committee, was received and lien concurred in. The Market Committee reported that they had onsulted with the Market House Association, who were opposed to making any change in the arrangement of the lower part of the market house. A reolution accompanied the report, declaring a change rexpedient, which was read three times and passed. The report of the Committee on City Printing was eturned from the Select Council, that body non concurring and referring the report back to the commit-tee. Common Council receded from their former ac-

ion and concurred. The Council then went into Committee of the Whole, for the purpose of considering the ordinance elative to the crossing of the Pittsburgh, Fort Wayne and Chicago Railroad, and Dr. A. G. M'Canless took the Chair. The ordinance, the provision which we have before published, was road, section y section. When the first section was read, Mr. retr moved to amend by making it necessary for the Company to construct their road so as to pass under Penn street, which was lost by a vote of 16 to 10. While considering the fourth section Mr. Errett moved that the part relative to the extending chains across Penn street, during the passage of trains, be stricken out, which was lost. The fifth section was amended so as to prevent the crossing of freight rains before ten o'cock at night or six in the morn-. This amendment was afterwards re considered and stricken out. The eleventh section fives the ompensation to the city for the crossing at \$100 per

wonth, and in case the Company shall fail to pay their installments for sixty days, the Mayor BANK-NOTIOE.


