Cody adhered to his story at the Mayor's office for some time, asserting that he was a stranger in the city, but finally acknowledged ne was not. The carpet sack was examined and cund to contain two valuable shawls, several collars, silk handkerchiefs, pieces of cassimere, and othe articles, all of which Messrs. Hess & Smith Edentified as belonging to them. These gentlemen are of opinion that he has been carrying away goods for some ime, and that a large amount has been "spirited off. Cady, however, denies this. He was committed to jail to answer the charge at the next term of Court.


